• Super Smash Club - Funding Passes as Recommended

■ Will Andriola: They're resubmitting from last week. They submitted an extensive explanation talking about the things we talked about here and why they still need it despite a lot of good points raised by Student Assembly. I'll read their explanation: We will offer an item description and also address the concerns brought up during the Student Assembly strategic meeting. These are televisions required to play Nintendo Switch games. The CRT TVs we have don't have the correct video input for Ultimate -- we use them for Super Smash Bros. Melee. We are requesting two televisions to accommodate members' Switches. This is especially important because Ultimate is very popular, particularly since it was released two months ago, and even if members bring two or three Switches between them, we only have a place to put one in Sadove Basement, so there always too few setups for the number of students who want to play. For example, see the picture from 2-14-19 to the right, where six people are on the one Switch. We often have more people than this (sometimes more than twice as many), and one person there at the time is not in the picture. There is little more saddening to us than having to witness people come in and then leave when they realize there is nowhere to play. That's not even including the others who are playing Melee or other games at the same time, but want to play Ultimate and cannot because of how many people are on the single setup. Multiple members have spoke to me (Tom) about how they would like to play *Ultimate, but that there are too many people on the setup. This is* exacerbated by the fact that most players would prefer to play 1 v. 1's or, secondarily, 2 v. 2's and would rather not play free-for-alls at all. Currently, we store several CRT TVs, Wiis, controllers, and other items in the Sadove basement storage room, which are not available for public use. They are used during each weekly meeting from 7pm-12am. That is the primary purpose of this club -- providing a gathering space for people to play together as a community, not providing the materials for friends to



come and play throughout the week. This also relates to the point that it makes no sense for us to use the TVs around campus with Switches instead. The entire point of the club is to gather together as one unit, to play against a variety of different people, and enjoy the game as a community rather than scattered groups throughout the campus. Additionally, as stated by Will Andriola and Amanda Kim during the meeting, we will not be carrying TVs all around campus and dropping them -- we will be storing them in the Sadove basement and moving them 10 feet. We have a cart, and if it becomes necessary, we could get another one. While it would be great to have a Switch and copy of Ultimate owned by the club, we chose to sacrifice them in our meeting with the funding committee the Sunday before the strategic budget meeting, because they are a vastly secondary priority to TVs. Optimally, of course, the club would own more than enough Wiis/Gamecubes, CRT TVs, game copies, regular TVs, Switches, controllers, and other materials, but we have to work with what we have and the funding available. We do intend to put Ultimate and a Switch (or multiple) on future strategic budgets, and if it ever becomes the case that we cannot rely on students bringing their own Switches, then it will immediately become priority number one. However, none of the members who come consistently and bring their Switches are seniors, so there is time. There are more than three members who would bring their Switch almost all the time, but currently, we only have the one TV in the basement. It is probable that more than two more TVs would be better, but we have decided to request two for the moment, and to reassess *later if we need more.*

- Karthik Ravishankar: I'm a big supporter, just putting this as a preface to this. Do you guys not want a Switch at all? If the issue is having more people than supply available. I mean I was also advocating that you guys should also get another Switch, on the condition that it can also be used by the public outside of your regular meeting hours. Not everyone can make that specific time.
 - **Paul Turner '20**: I think that's dope, but wouldn't Sadove fund that and put it on the third floor.
 - **Karthik Ravishankar**: I was just made aware of this opportunity that was available last week. But, there are no Switches there.
 - Paul Turner '20: What if instead of Smash funding going to Sadove, we can talk to Kaity and we could fund it through Sadove for people for public use.
 - a. Karthik Ravishankar: I like that
 - **Paul Turner '20**: Currently, we're not too concerned about Switches coming to the meeting. We have a sophomore and two



juniors that have Switches. At least one of them is coming every meeting There's at least two Switches every meeting

- Tom Parker '19: We would certainly like to get a Switch in the future, but it's a pretty low priority. As Paul said, we do have members who aren't graduating soon, who can bring their Switches.
 - a. Karthik Ravishankar: Fantastic.

• Culinary Society - Funding Passes as Recommended

- Will Andriola: They are buying a few permanent items for an event. I reached out to them and they said that they keep it in the DMC and that anyone can use them.
 - **Harry Dubke**: We funded a stockpile of cooking supplies for food clubs to cook.
 - **Gianni Hill**: Yeah they're in the kitchen downstairs in Sadove.
 - **Harry Dubke**: Then do we want to add it to the DMC so all the clubs could use it?
 - **Amanda Kim**: That's a good suggestion. We can suggest it to them.

• Women in Politics Club - Funding Passes as Recommended

- Will Andriola: It's under the \$5 per person price, so we're recommending funding that in full.
- Nasheley Boursiquot: Will it be an all campus event?
 - Will Andriola: The event is open to the public. They estimate twenty people will come. Professor Sullivan is going to speak about her experience as a woman in politics.

• Slow Foods - Funding Codes Suspended and Funding Passes as Approved

- Will Andriola: Because our funding codes say we can't fund off campus food if it's not overnight, we're recommending \$0. Of course that can be overridden by a ¾ majority vote from Student Assembly.
- Tierney Latham '21: I'm currently the treasurer of Slow Food. We are a club that promotes healthy, local, sustainable food choices. We do some on campus events and a lot of off-campus events to expose students to local dairy producers. One of our trips includes going to a local honeymaker and beekeeper. We do a lot of these trips to raise student awareness about these local, sustainable food options. Right now, we're not funded for any food for any of our trips, which is kind of counterintuitive to our goal and mission as a club. Last semester we were funded to get some food at some of our trips. For example, we went to a



local mushroom farm, a very local mushroom farm. We were funded to buy some mushrooms. We brought it back to campus and made a really great mushroom dinner. It was really fun and it gave the students the opportunity to taste the food we just saw growing in this garage mushroom farm, it was really awesome. We really feel that we should be funded for the food that we're buying. There is a lot of talk in the minutes from last week about some issues regarding per diem versus individual itemized food. There are some issues I talked to Will about regarding the lack of clarity regarding food for off-campus events. We would love it you could override it, because it's kind of the only thing our club does, so we kinda need your money. We'd be willing to lower the cost if that's a concern.

- **Lóri Fejes**: Have you looked at other sources of funding?
 - **Tierney Latham '21**: I certainly haven't. I'm not sure if we have in the past. If you have any recommendations regarding sources.
 - Lóri Fejes: Would Sadove money work?
 - Gianni Hill: It has to be in the physical building.
- Harry Dubke: What is the difference between funding them from last semester for certain things, versus funding them this semester.
 - Amanda Kim: It was because we can't fund food for an off-campus that's not overnight if it's not per diem. If it's a flat rate of food, then we can.
 - Will Andriola: The funding codes say that we can't fund off-campus food if it's not an overnight trip. I think that was the main problem.
 - **Tierney Latham '21**: The funding codes don't actually say anything about day-time, off-campus events. It's just assumed it's not allow.
 - Will Andriola: There are two sections: the food for on-campus events and food for off-campus events. Under food for on-campus events, it talks about the \$8 per student for food centric and \$5 per student. Section B, food for off-campus events says *organizations* may request up to \$15 per student, per night, spent off campus. It's all it says. We've taken that to say that you can't fund off-campus food unless it's overnight.
- **Nasheley Boursiquot**: The food you were trying to purchase with the \$510, is that food that you're getting from the farm, similar to how you did the mushrooms?
 - **Tierney Latham '21**: Exactly. This weekend for example, we're going to a bread company. At the end of the tour of the bread company, we would like to purchase some bread and other products to taste test them and taste what we just learned about



- **Alex Stetter**: What's the expected capacity. How many people will benefit from these events?
 - Tierney Latham '21: Our aim is to get two jitneys for each trip. For this weekend, we already reserved two jitneys and had thirteen people sign up. We will send another email out this week so we will hit that that twenty-four person capacity. In the past, it's only one full jitney that was very packed. Typically twelve to twenty-four people go. It's open to the entire campus, it's not like we just invite our club members. We send an email to all campus and whoever responds first gets on the trip.
- Ruben Martinez: What were the logistics in the argument for not giving them the funding. I know there was a BLSU event my freshman year that was overnight, but not everyone had to stay because it wasn't too far away. Given it's less than one day and then they'll be back, why don't we give them the funding. Unless it's going to increase the budget so much then why not? That being the obstacle, could we get around it?
 - Will Andriola: The overnight restriction just means the treasurers can't recommend giving them money because we have to follow the funding codes. The club decides whether it's overnight or not. There is a provision that the Central Council can override the funding codes if they want to.
- Harry Dubke: My suggestion, we should just override the funding codes. It would be cheaper and more efficient. It's pretty clear that these events are central to their club. It's slow food, it's not just learning about food but actually getting to taste it, that seems like a central tenet of their club. I call for the Central Council to override the rules with the ½ vote.
 - Amanda Kim: I'm also for this just because it would be cruel to make them watch how the food is made and not let them try it.
- Will Andriola: The only event on their budget that isn't fully itemized is that they're requesting \$8 per person for a festival. Maybe Student Assembly should consider not funding that specific event. It's not buying a direct item, it's just lunch in general.
 - **Harry Dubke**: With that particular item you could just itemize it and bring it back.
 - **Tierney Latham '21**: Yeah. That's really possible. We just need funding for that. We're not sure what we're going to buy, it's just a broad maple festival that we're going to, so we just put dollars. We can lower the cost or bring back an itemized list. That's not until March so we have some wiggle room with that.

- **Richard Court**: We should consider the sticker code, where we won't fund stickers unless it's a core aspect of the event. We don't fund food, but we should change that while we're at it.
- Finlay Adamson: Did you say it's per head costs that weren't allowed?
 - Amanda Kim: That was me. I got it wrong.
- Novelist Support Group Funding Passes as Recommended
- Bowling Club Funding Passes as Recommended
 - Will Andriola: They're requesting one more trip for this semester.
 - **Gianni Hill**: Why are you recommending that we fund Bowling Club after our discussion last week?
 - Will Andriola: It seemed like Student Assembly wanted to fund another trip. The actual budget met funding codes and seemed reasonable. It seemed like there was appetite to fund another trip, but that can be open to discussion. There's nothing to reject in the funding and it seemed like people wanted to fund it.
 - **Natalie Rodriguez '22**: Is there anything different about this trip as it is more expensive?
 - Will Andriola: This is the cost of everyone of their trips. This covers forty students and shoes and the lanes
 - Amanda Kim: Would this be a sixth trip for them?
 - Will Andriola: We funded three through strategic. This would be the fifth one through Student Assembly. Two non-strategic and then the one through FebFest.
 - Amanda Kim: How many do we usually fund?
 - Savannah Kelly: It was four last semester.
- Anthropology Club Funding Passes as Recommended
 - Will Andriola: They submitted this last week as part of strategic and the food wasn't itemized. They resubmitted again this week and it was itemized. We had to cut one event by \$5 because it was above the \$5 per person maximum.
- Special K Funding Passes as Recommended
 - Will Andriola: We are going to be meeting with the a cappella groups to see if they can make recording costs more consistent across them. Since at this point we haven't done so, and their costs are lower than the other groups, we're recommending funding them in full.
- Juggling Club Funding Passes as Recommended



■ Will Andriola: They forgot to include shipping costs and they were getting new juggling clubs. This is a good use of non-strategic funds because it's something they forgot and not something major.

• Residential Advisors - Funding Passes as Recommended

- Will Andriola: I don't think they're a student organization, so I don't think we can fund them. Also, I don't think we should be funding things for college employees that are being told what to do through Student Activities money.
- Noelle Niznik: They're not paid employees in the normal sense. I know RAs don't have a well funded budget in regards to per person. That said, they aren't a student organization, so I don't believe they can get the funding that way. If they were partnering with Figure Club or something like that, that could be a way around it.
- Ruben Martinez: As a former RA, I would definitely recommend that we fund this to support RAs. For me to fund two boxes of pizza events for one floor was really hard. That was the one event. I'm not saying that RAs don't get money, but we have to put so many events on.
 - **Amanda Kim**: If we really want to fund this, we could do it through discretionary, right?
 - Alex Kurtz: Yeah.
 - Amanda Kim: Alex says we can, so that's an option.
- Harry Dubke: I like the idea of helping RAs, but I don't think we should just start funding RAs because that shifts the responsibility for funding events from the school to us. I'm sure the school would love that I don't like the school shifting their responsibility to take away funds from clubs. If they partner with a club, I love that idea. If it's them just not getting money from the school and expecting us to pick up the slack, I don't like that at all.
 - Ruben Martinez: I think this is why I would support them. As RAs we've been advocating for that, because we're still required to do those things. We do want to make it fun, but what is the school doing to make it possible?
 - Will Andriola: They did mention that they have \$100 for the event from the school. Going back to your point, it seems like they are expecting us to pick up the slack.
 - Harry Dubke: I wouldn't mind RAs get in here and talk about that in front of the school so other people know about that problem. It's important because we all have RAs.
- Karthik Ravishankar: Gianni I know you're an RA too, you know the budget is quite pitiful. I want to push strongly about what Harry said

 - Gianni Hill: You have to keep tabs on that \$50.
 - **Richard Court**: Some RA's have ten people while others have like fifty.
 - Amanda Kim: Everyone gets a small bottle of water.
 - Gianni Hill: I believe this is an area event. We have area and zone events, four zones and two areas, which are northside and southside. Area programs get \$100 in funding while zone ones get \$50 on top of the funds RAs have. If ten RAs come together and pool their funds together and plan it together, then they can use what they have as well.
- Amanda Kim: I agree with Harry. I don't like the idea of setting a precedent that this is Student Assembly's responsibility to fund when it should really be Residential Life. I think that rather than funding this, the best course of action would be for Student Assembly to maybe facilitate a discussion between the Resident Advisors and Res Life.
 - **Gianni Hill**: FRSH should look at that. Contact Ashley Place, she's the director of Res. Life.
 - **Ben Rhind**: We can look into that.

 - Amanda Kim: Is there a reason why the Society of Physics Students and College Democrats didn't submit these budgets during strategic?
 - Will Andriola: No, not as far as I know.
